Master of Science in Community Medicine

MSCM

The two-year online Master of Science in Community Medicine program will prepare community medicine practitioners and leaders who work in underserved and underrepresented communities for careers devoted to improving health, preventing illness and injury, and detecting treatable medical conditions early enough to avoid premature death and unnecessary poor health.



ASYNCHRONOUS CLASSES

All courses will be taught online, asynchronously to increase access to the program from anywhere in the country.



COMMUNITY-BASED LEARNING

Students identify an appropriate community setting or select from one provided by the MSCM program to serve as the student's hands-on learning "laboratory" during their second year.



JOB READINESS

Graduates will be qualified to work in community medicine immediately, or be prepared to pursue advanced education in healthcare provider professions.

About the Program

The 54-credit MSCM program prepares students as skilled Advanced Community Medicine Practitioners to work in community clinics, Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs), public health departments, healthcare systems, Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs), and industries that serve those communities. Students will obtain specific mastery in healthcare problem identification, healthcare problem response, and healthcare systems management. Day and evening courses available.

In the **first year**, students take courses to build the foundation of their knowledge. All students will be expected to achieve competency in four basic sciences: human bioscience, behavioral science, analytic science, and contextual science.

In the **second year**, students apply their mastered knowledge to real-life experiences. Students choose from two elective tracks to engage in-depth within community medicine practice, and spend a full semester on each rotation. To graduate, each student is required to complete a capstone project. Students will also obtain applied skills specific to the practice of community medicine: clinical communication skills, community health skills, consumer skills, and leadership skills.

Differences Between a Master of Public Health and a Master of Science in Community Medicine



- A Master of Public Health is a broad, general public health graduate degree that prepares public health professionals to work in a wide range of public health and community settings, and whose general purpose is to improve health.
- KGI's Master of Science in Community Medicine is a focused, skills- and knowledge-based graduate degree that prepares leaders and practitioners who work in underserved and underrepresented communities to decrease demand for medical care services by empowering communities to improve health and prevent disease and illness.

Dates and Deadlines

Application Requirements

An online application form is required that contains questions about your personal and educational background. Additional requirements can be submitted along with your online application or separately:

- Personal Statement
- Resume
- Letter of Recommendation
- Transcripts
- \$75 non-refundable application fee

Admission Interviews: A phone, Skype, Zoom, or on-campus interview is a requirement for admission. The Office of Admissions schedules individual interviews after an application is complete.

Application Review: The Admissions Committee is made up of faculty and senior administrators who will thoroughly and conscientiously review each application.

Admitted Students: Admitted students are required to submit a \$250 non-refundable enrollment fee to hold their spot in the program.
